Attendance and Purpose

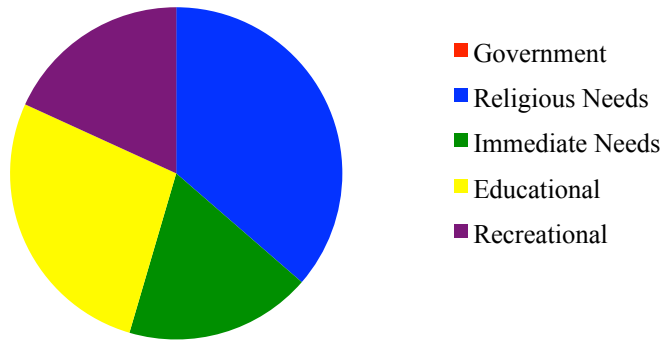
Faribault organizations encourage attendance when the motivation of the attendees matches the event's purpose. When the purpose of the event does not cater to the needs and interests of the community, we see negative effects on attendance.

Event Categorization

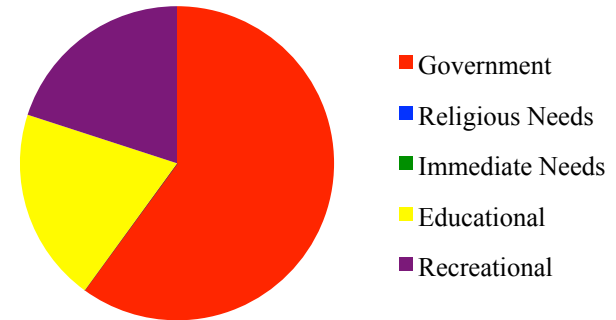
- Did reach its intended audience: If the demographic specified in the purpose was present.
- Did not reach its intended audience: If an event specified its purpose as reaching a certain demographic which was not present.
- Demographics considered include: Families, parents, the public, age demographics like senior citizens and teens, certain races, speakers of a certain language, those of a specific religion, those of a specific income level, and those with lifestyle commonalities (eBooks, gifted children, general interests).

Events and Their Intended Audience

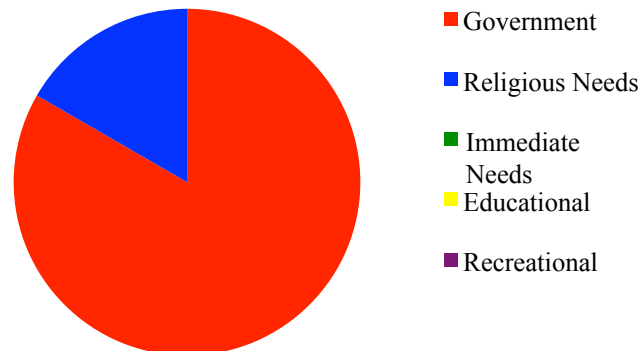
Intended Audience Reached

Motivation

Motivation

- The most successful events catered to the needs of their specific audience whereas other events did not reach their intended audience.
- Language accessibility also influenced increased attendance.

Example: Spanish Language Service at Divine Mercy Catholic Church

Purpose: To provide worship opportunities for the congregation's Spanish-speaking members in their own language

Attendance: 400-500

Motivation

- The most successful events catered to the needs of their specific audience whereas other events did not reach their intended audience.
- Language accessibility also influenced increased attendance

Example: 10/25 City Council Meeting

Purpose: To inform the public of agenda items

Attendance: Only the few citizens who had direct interest in an agenda item (to the extreme of leaving once their item was covered)

Motivation

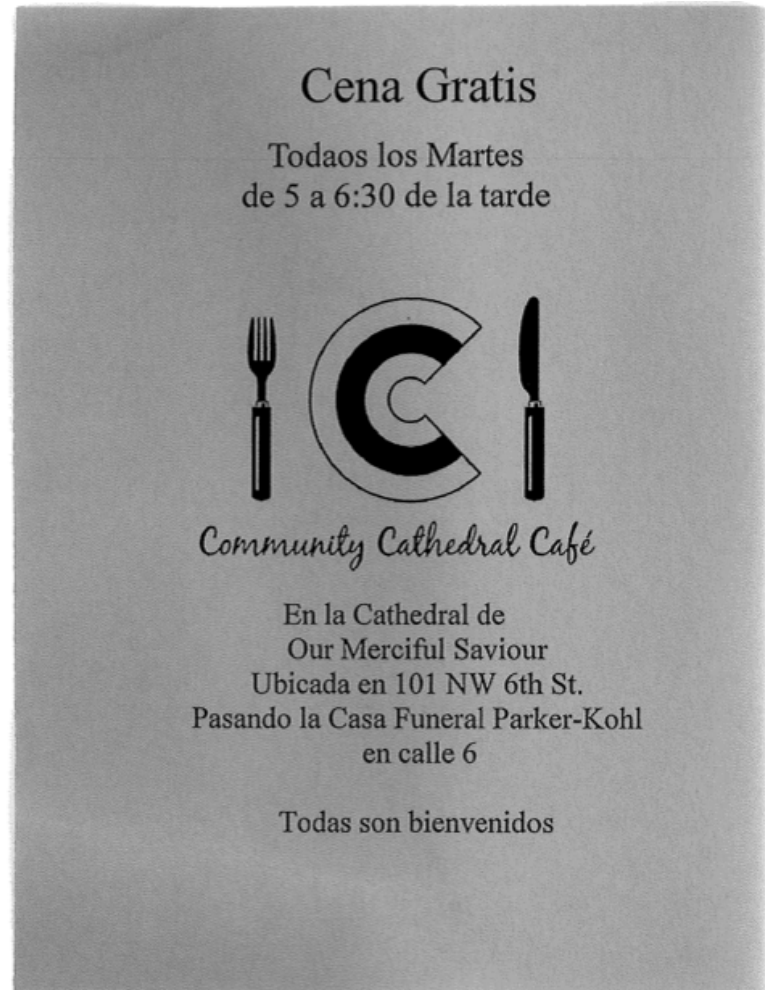
- The most successful events catered to the needs of their specific audience whereas other events did not reach their intended audience.

Example: Community Cathedral Café

Purpose: "To serve the community...on reduced or fixed incomes...place for socialization for elders"

Attendance: 100-125 including elders and lower income community members

Inclusivity & Accessibility

While there is very little formalized exclusion at public events in Faribault, many of the common practices and materials are not as inclusive as they could be.

- Lack of background information,
- limited non-English language incorporation, and
- assumed knowledge at public events

may hinder the participation and comfort of immigrant community members.

Assumed Knowledge of Process

- The problem of assumed knowledge leads to lower levels of comfort.

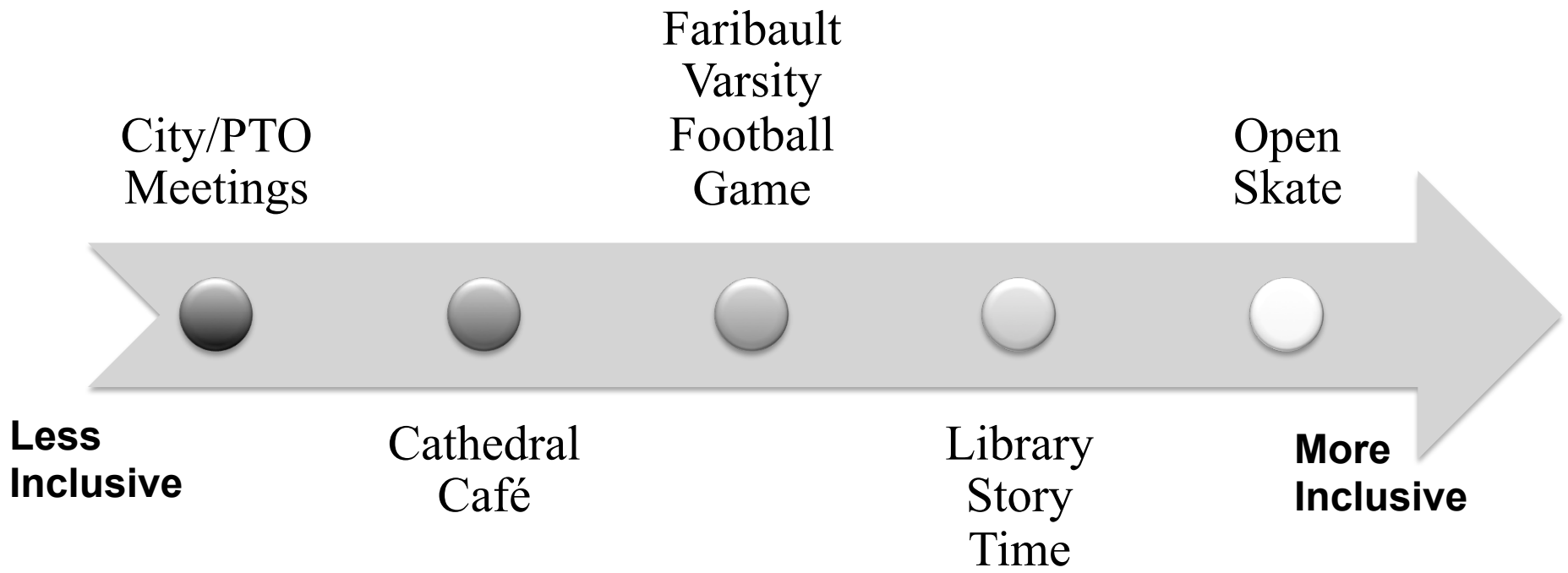

Range of Inclusion

- Levels of inclusion varied among the different types of events.



Relationship Building

Rather than observing relationship building, we saw relationships being maintained. Three characteristics of this phenomenon at the events we attended were:

1. a sense of informality,
2. an emphasis on family history and legacy, and
3. the presence of an in-group/out-group dynamic.

Informality

- Even at formal events such as PTO and City Council meetings some people interacted, dressed, and behaved informally.
- There is not much of a barrier between those who play different roles due to this informality.

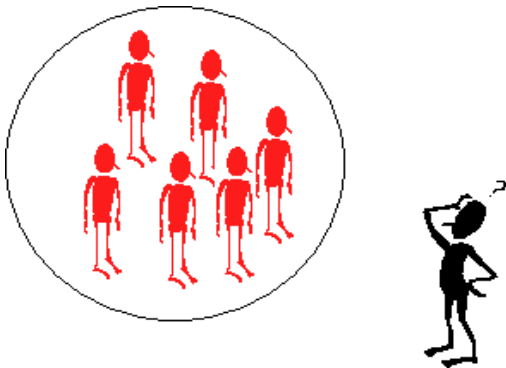
Family History and Legacy

- People take pride in their family history and legacy in Faribault.
- This sense of pride is seen in the interactions and relationships being maintained at public events in Faribault.



In-group/Out-group Dynamic

- We observed a disconnect between the people responsible for the meeting and those attending for the first time.
- There were reactions of surprise and confusion when newcomers attended events.



Direct Participation

Three main types of participation were observed:

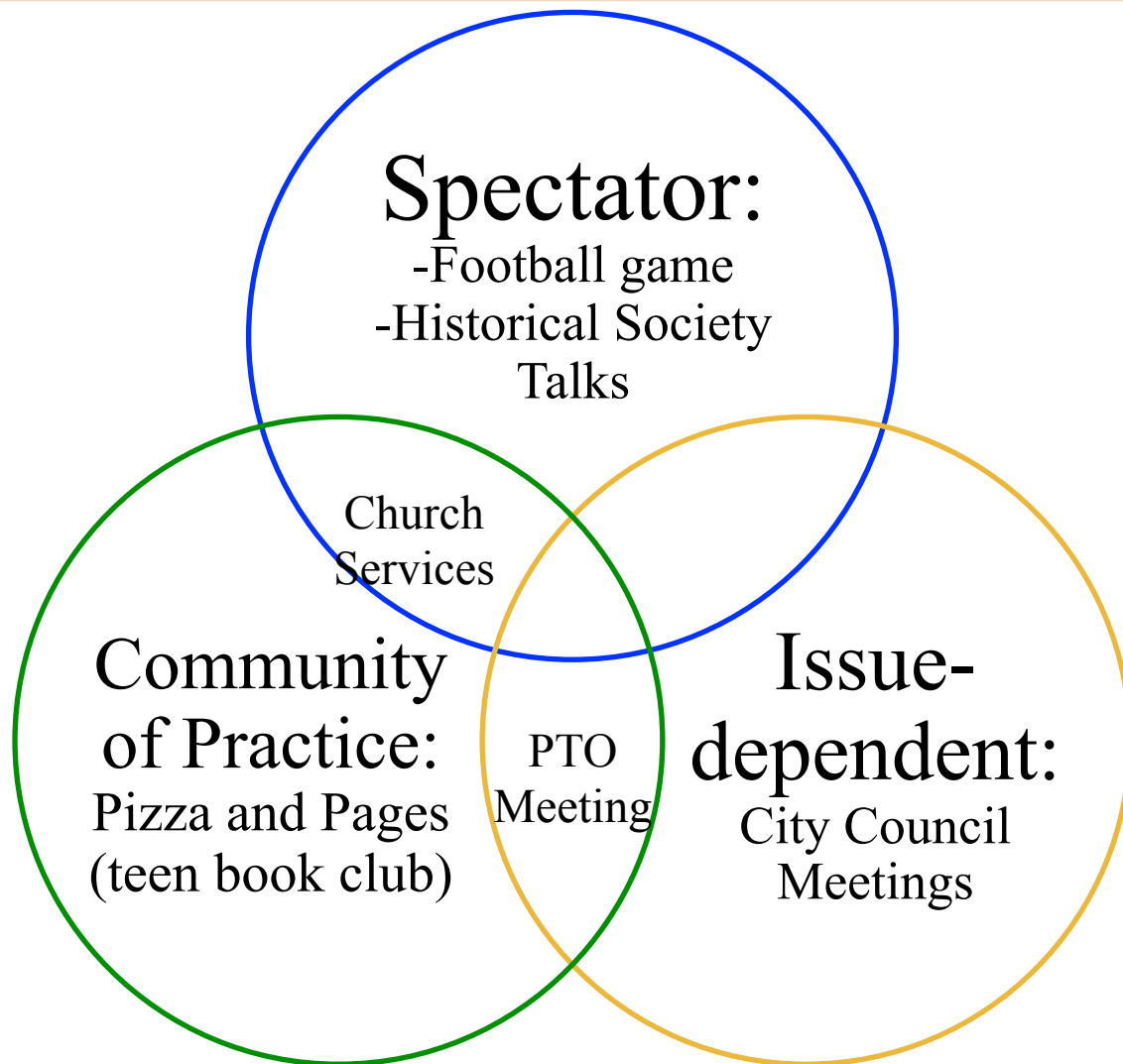
- passive participation in spectator events
- issue-dependent participation in formal events, and
- active participation in communities of practice.

Events reflected both cultural and generational gaps. Barriers to participation included language, unclear proceedings and lack of publicity.

Three Types of Participation

- Spectator: event conveys information or entertains (passive participation)
- Issue-dependent: attendees participate in order to address specific issues (formal participation)
- Communities of practice: sense of collective ownership of event (active participation)
