Recommended for today and Monday: as much of the rest of Melchert's chapter 13 as is consistent with your sanity; pp. 330-31 have important definitions of Innate Ideas and of Solipsism; the Third Meditation has a famously unconvincing argument for God's existence but the Fourth, in the second column on p. 349 and the first column on p. 350 has a snappy version of the Ontological Argument; p. 354 has interesting thoughts on the mind-body relationship and on where colors exist; and the conclusion of the *Meditations* in the second column of p. 356 shows you how you know that right now you are not dreaming (this is not a nightmare!)
